Sewage Grinder Pumps

Every residence in Rock Falls is served by a grinder pump that grinds household waste, liquefies it, and pumps it into the city-wide sewer distribution system. It is sometimes helpful to remember that a pressurized sewer system can be a bit more sensitive than gravity systems that do not have a grinder-pump.

A properly maintained grinder pump should be able to handle wastewater from the kitchen, bathroom, laundry, etc. However, some chemicals and substances can adversely impact a grinder pump and may cause safety hazards. Check the labels on all chemicals before using or disposing. Also, never pour the following items down the drains or flush down toilets:

Grease! (a by-product of cooking that comes from meat fats, oils, shortening, butter, margarine, food scraps, sauces and dairy products)

Explosive or flammable material

Kitty litter

Aquarium gravel

Strong chemicals or toxic, caustic or poisonous substances

These items can damage the grinder pump and its controls, cause blockages and backups and may create unsafe conditions within the lines and tank. Also, never connect a sump pump to sewer lines. The added ground water from a sump pump can cause additional wear to the grinder pump and overload the sewer system.

If a resident needs to be away for extended periods, it could be helpful to replace the waste water in the tank with clean water to help minimize odors. Run an inside faucet for about 10 minutes—long enough for the grinder pump to start working. After the pump starts, turn the faucet off. The pump will run until the tank is nearly empty and shut off automatically. This process will cleanse the pump and keep it filled with a minimum amount of clean water. If the absence is for several weeks, also notify PeopleService, Inc. of the absence so the company can check the tank and pump periodically and flush the lines to keep the machinery in good working order.

Progress in City Park
